Dear Church Family,

I'm back from Annual Conference and vacation, and I'm ready to dive back into life together with you.

Summer is here! Do you remember those lazy, hazy days of summer? As a kid, I spent much time with my grandparents in Sekiu. The world seemed to move more slowly out

there. I explored the beach, listened to their "good ol' days" stories, learned to bake with Grandma, and helped prepare picnics on the patio. Slowing down allowed me to observe in wonder, gain wisdom, and deepen my relationship with them.

What is your version of your grandparents' house in Sekiu? I hope you've had a place of respite like that, either in your youth or even now.

What if God is like my grandparents? (They would laugh at this statement.) God Who offers rest, wonder, and exploration. Perhaps God wants to teach us how to make the best buttery pancakes with a perfect crisp edge, or to tell us stories of many adventures. Maybe God asks us to get the paper plates out for the family picnic, reach for that jar of pickles in the back of the cupboard, and find that ice cream in the deepfreeze. Perhaps God has some wisdom to impart over that 7 a.m. cup of Folgers.

What if God simply wants us to spend time with them?

Sometimes it feels like we have too many things on our list to do and we can't slow down. This can easily drain your spirit.

What are we missing out on when we are busy? Are we slowing down enough to hear God? Are we even able to hear others—or ourselves? God designed us to need rest. God created something called Sabbath, asking us to make a consistent plan for rest a priority.

We invite you to our summer worship series, "Summer Soul Siesta: Cultivating Connexion through Sacred Rest." This series is about embracing rest, finding peace, and deepening our connection with God and each other.

Jesus calls his followers to more than just "doing stuff." Scripture invites us to see our lives and bodies as gifts that should be nurtured. Jesus calls us to a holistic life, living with rhythms that allow us to thrive and finding a balance between work, play, rest, and reflection.

In addition to scripture, I'll reference a book by a God-loving medical doctor. "Sacred Rest: Recover Your Life, Renew Your Energy, Restore Your Sanity" by Dr. Saundra Dalton-Smith shares how not having a rest plan leads to poor health. She also discusses different categories of exhaustion and solutions to gain rest accordingly.

We are also having a Connexional summer. The last Sunday of each summer month will be a Connexional Sunday, sharing in worship and fellowship

Youth Update from Pastor Golden

Our major activity last spring was an art project in preparation for Easter. Each youth was given a blank canvas and a scripture passage of Jesus' last journey to Jerusalem including his crucifixion. They were to read the scripture passage and paint a picture of what was important to them. On the back of each canvas is a description of the scripture passage and the artist's interpretation. The canvases were arranged on a wall in the sanctuary (pictured above). On Easter, a hidden message was revealed. It has been a long tradition to present youth with Bibles. Prior to the pandemic, youth would attend Sunday school and would be presented their Bible during the worship service. This function of our church has been overlooked for a few years.

During one of our meetings a youth mentioned that he did not have a Bible to read and use as a reference. One of our church members generously volunteered to purchase Bibles for the youth in our program free of charge. The Common English Bible (CEB) Student Bible was chosen to meet their needs. The student Bible has various features: an introduction to each book of the Bible, maps, 400 articles by scholars, prayers written by students, and church study materials. The Bibles have a soft cover and are well designed. These Bibles will be able to meet the needs of the youth for many years as they grow and have questions. In May, George Derry was presented his Bible during Sunday worship. The Bibles are now available for the youth to pick up.

Summer is upon us, and camp season is starting. We are off to a late start promoting summer camp to our youth. Information about the four camp locations and dates is being disseminated. Most of the registration is being done online through the pnwcamps.org website. An instruction page to navigate the website is being provided with the camp information to families. Any financial contribution to support our youth or camp ministry is greatly appreciated. May the blessings of Christ be with you all.

Rev. Davis will be preaching at Centralia First UMC on August 18th. Please welcome our pastor's friend.




REV. TERRI STEWART
